Adjectives Clauses is simply a group of words with a subject and a verb that provide a description. The clause starts with a pronoun such as **who, whom, that, or which** or an adverb such as **when, where** and **why**. Adjective clauses do not change the basic meaning of the sentence. In some cases, when they provide more information into a sentence, they need to be set off with commas.

Examples:

- Pizza, which most people love, is not very healthy.
- The people whose names are on the list will go to camp.
- Grandpa remembers the old days when there was no television.
- Fruit that is grown organically is expensive.
